Dear Parents

As we rapidly approach the end of term, we are just as busy as ever here at the College.

We have had two visits this week which have enabled us to share our own good practice, as well as given us the opportunity to reflect on how we can develop even further. On Wednesday, we welcomed Alex Gavins, the senior educational lead from Leading Edge and SSAT to KC. Alex had hosted the workshop Mr Baines and I ran at the national SSAT conference last week and she was visiting the College to gain firsthand experience of our practices. She was able to give us links to other high performing schools to help challenge our thinking, and she will also share

our practice and put other schools in touch with us where we can help them. This collaborative way of working is very important to us at the College. Our second visit was from representatives of the Treasury and the DfE. Kingsthorpe College had been selected as one of ten secondary schools nationally to take part in a research visit by the Treasury. The Treasury will use this research to compile a report and case studies which will be published nationally and will share excellent practice in relation to financial planning, including the strategic deployment of staff and resources. Colleagues from the Treasury were particularly interested to hear about our recent work in relation to recruitment, retention, leadership development, and the systematic mapping of talent across our workforce to ensure we have effective succession planning across the College.

This time of year is always a time where College leaders reflect on the impact of the work we have undertaken to date this academic year. To this end, College governors have been meeting with senior leaders to review our progress against our school development priorities. These meetings are a great opportunity for all of us involved in the leadership of the College to celebrate our successes as well as identify next steps and work for the forthcoming Spring Term. We have an outstanding Governing Board at Kingsthorpe College and we have some exciting developments planned so that all stakeholders can engage more frequently with our Governors - further information will follow after the Christmas holidays.

There has been a lot of exciting and successful work undertaken recently by our young enterprise and business students, and I would recommend reading the report from Miss Fisher later in the newsletter. We were also delighted to welcome a performer from the West End to the College this week and he spent the day with our Hairspray cast and our Year 7 Girls' Choir helping them finetune their performances in readiness for the end of term performances. A great time was had by all!

As the weather forecast turns more inclement, and with significant snow forecast for this weekend, please see details later in the newsletter about our policy and procedures for wintry weather. Up to date information will be published and regularly refreshed on the website. It is of course always our intention to keep the College open where it is safe to do so for

both our staff and students.

Finally, an advance notice that the College will close for the Christmas break at 12.30pm on Wednesday 20th December. A letter detailing arrangements will be sent home with your son or daughter this week, as well as being made available on our website.

Snow Procedures

Following the recent forecasts, we are writing to remind you of the procedures that will be followed during periods of time when there is snow on the school site.

We will do everything possible to keep Kingsthorpe College open during snowy conditions – your child's education is very important to us and missing time due to inclement weather can impact on future progress. We also fully appreciate the difficulties this causes in terms of child care.

If snow has fallen overnight and we have to take the difficult decision to close the school, we will inform you via text, and we will post a message on the school website front page. We will also contact Northamptonshire County Council. Any school closure will occur on a day-by-day basis and we will aim to get this information out by 7.30am, if not before.

If snow falls during the day to such a degree that we have to take the

decision to send students home early, we will inform you in exactly the same way as above. We will also allow any student with a mobile phone to contact you to arrange for child care arrangements and enable any students without mobile phones to use a school phone to contact you. If no contact can be made, we assure you that a Senior member of staff will stay on school site with those students until we are confident that they can get home and that an appropriate adult has been informed.

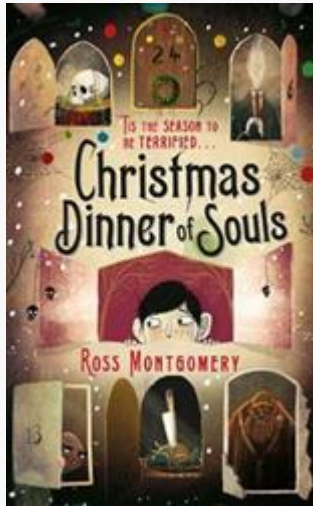
In the interest of health and safety, students are not allowed to throw snowballs in any areas of the school and will receive consequences; including the loss of their break times should they not observe this direction. As the snow turns to ice no snowballs will be allowed. Students are informed and are usually very mature and compliant in this respect, recognising the risk of injury.

Please make every effort to send your child to school in the snowy conditions as non-attendance due to snow may have to be recorded as an 'unauthorised' absence.

Definition: having or showing an ability to accurately assess situations or people and turn this to one's advantage.

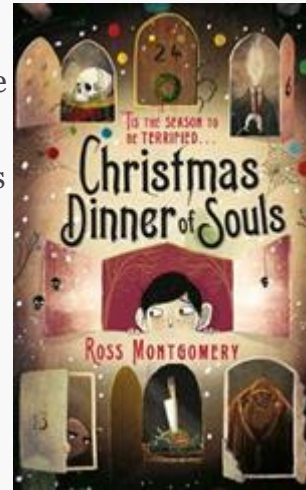
Try and use this word in a sentence this week. My sentence is,

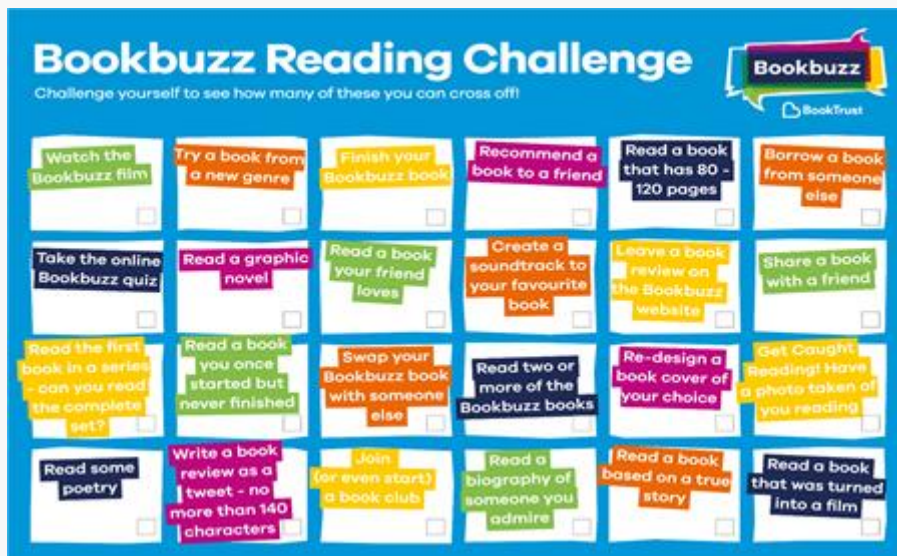
It will be a wonderful treat for our students to meet such a fantastic author. As part of the event there will also be a chance to buy books which will be signed personally by Ross.

- ChildLine: £60 (Year 7 bric-a-brac stall)

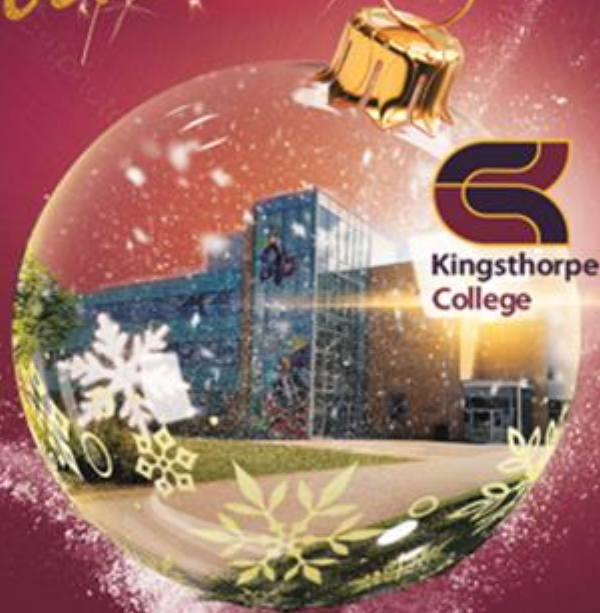
- RSCPA: £283 (£111 from the Christmas tombola ran and organised by some of our year 7 students, and £172 from the RCPCA stall)
