Dear Parents

It doesn't seem as if it has only been a week since we welcomed our students back after the half-term break! We have been really pleased with the focused start that all students have made, and in particular, the message we gave students about hooded tops before the break has clearly been listened to – many thanks for your support with this.

It was a privilege on the first day back to be invited to a Year 8 High Tea. This was part of a Technology project which involved some of our Year 8 students researching, planning and preparing a traditional High Tea. The food was delicious and it was a lovely opportunity to sit down and enjoy a cup of tea whilst listening to the reasons for the students' menu choices. A huge thank you to Mrs Ainscow for organising this. The food theme continued later in the week when myself and Mr Hancock

invited a range of students for lunch to discuss our current provision for rewarding students. It was a really interesting and productive lunch, and we talked about all aspects of our reward system including the frequency of rewards, different types of rewards, ways for students to gain rewards, and much more. Mr Hancock and I left with lots of ideas – some of which we will trial this half-term – and we were both reminded how articulate and engaging our students are.

It was fantastic to see so many of our Y11 students at the Class of 2017 launch on Tuesday after school and we were really impressed with just how many students gave up their own time to commit to the launch. Students were shown a series of inspirational video clips and engaged in focused group discussions about making the most of the next few weeks in the run up to the summer exam season. The students were also made aware of the wide variety of strategies we will be supporting them with over the next few weeks.

All Y11 students received an exam pack containing post it notes, marker pens, flash cards and other useful revision aids. This pack also included, most importantly, a personalised USB drive containing a wide variety of subject specific resources to help support their learning while revising for their exams. The exam timetable is now live on the College website and individual exam timetables have been sent out this week so please discuss this with your son/daughter and check all entries have been made and that there are no errors.

As a follow up to this launch, a large number of parents attended the revision workshop on Thursday evening where a number of revision strategies were shared by members of the senior leadership team to help parents support their son/daughter through the stressful exam period. This workshop will be repeated later on this term.

We will continue this half-term to work on our priorities of ensuring that all students are able to achieve their potential by having an attendance of at least 96%, and on providing excellent teaching and learning opportunities which raise the bar and narrow the gap for all our students. We will, of course, update you on how you can help support us in these areas as this term progresses.

I look forward to continuing to work with you this term – as ever, please do get in touch if there are any further ways we can help support your son or daughter.

Purple House


Georgia - Year 7 P4

She will be completely vindicated by the evidence.





Love to play chess?


